
A message from FSBPA's Chair, Leanne Welch








Please set aside an hour on Thursday after lunch to enjoy an educational short course on Inlets.

"Inlets and Beaches 101" presents fundamental concepts of how coastal inlets "work", in simple language and through This 50-minute presentation will descriptive graphics. describe how currents and sand move through tidal inlets, and how inlets affect the adjacent beaches. It is intended for laymen, public officials, administrators, and other persons without a coastal engineering background who have an interest in Florida's beaches, inlet management, and beach erosion control. Topics include fundamental inlet terminology (vocabulary), understanding the flow of water and sand through an inlet, the formation of tidal shoals, the differences between natural and dredged inlets, the role of jetties and terminal structures, identifying the impact of an inlet upon the adjacent shorelines, the meaning and calculation of an inlet sediment budget, natural and artificial sand-bypassing,





various ways to mitigate inlet impacts upon adjacent beaches, a brief overview of computer- and physical models of inlet processes, and examples of successful (and some not-so-successful) inlet

management schemes.

This lecture is presented by Dr. Kevin Bodge, a senior coastal engineer with Olsen Associates, Inc., who enjoys making science & engineering accessible through entertaining graphics, humor, and simple concepts.






IN RECOGNITION OF FSBPA'S 2016 AWARD WINNERS

Cliff Truitt, Per Bruun Distinguished Service Award



Cliff has been selected to receive the Per Bruun Distinguished Service Award, named after the first Director of Coastal Engineering at UF and founder of FSBPA, for his 40 years significant contributions preservation. Cliff has an extensive career in both private and public sectors where he enjoyed roles as Bureau Chief for the Department of Natural Resources; Hydraulic Engineer Coastal at the Engineering Research Center - the precursor to the USACE's Coastal and Hydraulics Laboratory; Senior Scientist and Director of the Mote Marine Laboratory; and Coastal Engineer for the past 20 years, currently with Taylor Engineering. He has contributed to over 30 publications and presentations and published technical notes and manuals such as the "Tidal Inlet Dynamics" and is an active volunteer in his community. On a final but very special note, Cliff served our country in the Army Reserves for 26 years and retired with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. Please join us in toasting our dear friend and colleague at the Awards Banquet on September 15th.

Jason Harrah, Richard Bonner Award



Jason S. Harrah will be presented the Richard E. Bonner Award at the 2016 Awards Banquet for his commitment and ability to direct and manage complex projects from start to finish. Jason has an extensive 13 year career with the Army Corps of Engineers (5 with the Huntington District in West Virginia and 8 years with the Jacksonville District). He has spent the last eight years working as a Project Manager on a variety of key projects to include Everglades Restoration, Hebert Hoover Dike Rehabilitation and several shoreline and navigation projects along the eastern coast of Florida. These projects include Miami-Dade County

Shore Protection Project (SPP), Flagler County SPP, Duval County SPP, Nassau County SPP, Jacksonville Harbor Mile Point, Jacksonville Harbor O&M, and the Jacksonville Harbor Port Deepening Project. He was nominated by his colleagues because of his steadfast ability to overcome challenges, just like the award's namesake Richard Bonner. Please join FSBPA as we show our appreciation to Jason for his commitment and support of Florida's coastal program.

J. Gary McAlpin, Local Government Award

Gary McAlpin will be recognized for the FSBPA 2016 Local Government Award for his 11 years of distinguished service to Collier County's beach preservation and inlet management programs and unwavering commitment to public safety. He is the Director of the County's Coastal Zone Management Department and manages a team of dedicated staff to preserve and enhance the County's coastal resources. Gary was nominated for his leadership role and more importantly for his innovative methods to minimize environmental impacts and construction costs while successfully managing 34 miles

of shoreline and six shallow draft inlets. He has found ways to successfully place high quality sand along the beaches of Vanderbilt, Park Shore, and Naples, incorporate a range of construction options in his state and federal permits, and maximize state and federal funding for nourishment projects to lessen the County's financial commitments. FSBPA is grateful for Gary's dedication to Collier County and to the Association and is excited to be a part of the award presentation at the banquet.

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FSBPA Annual Conference Field Trips

Limited Space Available, Reservations Required

Collier County is planning three excursions for participants at the FSBPA Annual Conference. Space is limited for each excursion, and all are dependent on good weather.

Turtle Nest Excavation – this group will be led by Maura Kraus on Wednesday, 9/14, from ~6 p.m. until sunset. This session will discuss Collier County's turtle program, nesting history, successes, issues, accomplishments and problems along with excavating/examining recently hatched or late hatching nests. The nest excavations are exciting and must be completed before sunset so the eggs can be examined and evaluated in the light. Any hatchlings still in the nests will be immediately released. Location of the turtle hatching investigation will be announced the week of the conference. Attendees will be walking on the beach - appropriate clothing and shoes a must.

Clam Pass mangrove walk and discussion - this group will be led by the Conservancy of SW Florida on Thursday, 9/15, from 2:30 to 4:00 p.m. The Mangrove Tour will assemble at the shuttle drop-off location at the hotel. The Conservancy regularly conducts these tours and discusses ecology of the mangrove forest, habitat, benefits to the estuary and wildlife. Clam Pass is a truly unique coastal habitat and mangrove forest expressive of a predevelopment period of history.

Artificial reef dive trip – this group will be led by Chris D'Arco on Thursday, 9/15, from 1 to 5 p.m. The excursion is limited to 10 certified divers and registered conference attendees. This dive trip will begin at Bayview Park, Naples, where divers will be led to several artificial reefs and view different levels of habitat development relative to placement date. Dive equipment will be the responsibility of each diver and may be rented from Scuba Adventures (971 Creech Rd, Naples, FL, 239-434-7477). A signed liability wavier will be required to participate in this excursion.

- Investigate with our turtle monitoring staff recently erupted turtle nests, help uncover unhatched eggs, record nest results, possibly rescue lagging hatchlings, discuss issues affecting nesting success and talk about issues effecting this endangered species.
- Tour the Clam Pass Mangrove forest and experience its beauty. Discuss with nature guides the
 positive benefits of the mangrove forests to the ecology of Southwest Florida.
- Dive several of Collier County's recently deployed artificial reefs and see firsthand the development of Collier County's offshore ecology.



During the conference, our program presentations will include the history of Collier County's Beach Renourishment Program and also discuss the challenges of maintaining six shallow draft coastal inlets.

In addition, Collier County is home to excellent dining and shopping, especially along Fifth Avenue South with enviable ambiance and charm, and the historic Third Street South. Very near your conference hotel are a number of great dining experiences. You will soon discover why Naples and Marco Island dining is a foodie's Paradise. 



Report to Congress on Future Water Resources Development



The Section 7001 Federal Register Notice (FRN) was published on May 27th and is posted on the Report to Congress on Future Water Resources Development HQ webpage. Section 7001 of the Water Resources Reform and Development Act (WRRDA) of 2014 requires that the secretary of the Army annually submit to Congress a report which identifies completed feasibility studies, proposed feasibility studies, and proposed modifications to authorized projects which meet all of the following criteria:

- Are related to the missions and authorities of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE). USACE primary missions are navigation, flood risk management, and aquatic ecosystem restoration. Recreation, hydropower and/or water supply will be considered "related" when it is performed in conjunction with one or more of the primary mission(s).
- Require specific congressional authorization.
- Have not been congressionally authorized.
- Have not been included in the main table of a previous annual report.
 If authorized could be carried out by the Corps of Engineers.

The annual Report to Congress on Future Water Resources Development is based, in part, on requests for proposals for authorization from non-Federal interests for proposed feasibility studies and proposed modifications to authorized projects or studies that require authorization for the Corps of Engineers to proceed. Once submitted, the studies and modifications are considered by Congress for potential authorization. It is important to note that inclusion into the annual Report does not provide or guarantee authorization or appropriation for a study or project.

Proposals can be submitted online at www.wrrda7001proposals.us. The request for Section 7001 proposals was published in the Federal Register on May 27th. The deadline to submit a proposal is **September 19th**, **2016**. 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FDEP Division of Water Resource Management Agency Updates

Self-Certification Now Available for Certain CCCL Field Permits



Starting July 2016, small coastal projects can benefit from the state of Florida's online environmental permitting. Minor construction and other activities seaward of a coastal construction control line (CCCL) require permits from the Florida Department of Environmental Protection's (FDEP). For many small upland CCCL projects, FDEP's Division of Water Resource Management now offers an easy to use on-line permit process. Called "ESSA" after Enterprise Self Service Authorization, the new self-certification process is available for certain minor construction, beach cleaning, and special events. ESSA is easy to use and is accessed through the FDEP Business Portal.

ESSA self-certification is not available for all projects that have historically been field permitted by the state's CCCL program. Restrictions apply depending on the type of project - minor construction, special event, or beach cleaning - to be permitted. For instance, CCCL ESSA self-certification of minor construction is only available for small projects in the side or front yards landward of beachfront homes, not in the back yards on the seaward or beachside. For beach cleaning and special events, self-certification is limited to specific geographic areas depending on the timing of the activity relative sea turtle nesting season. CCCL ESSA self-certifications are not available for Florida Keys and Big Bend beaches.

Following the online step by step instructions, it is easy to register for or sign into the Business Portal, click on buttons "Apply", then "Build", and finally "Field Permit for Minor Structures and Activities Seaward of the CCCL" and start entering project information. Once in the application process, a useful "Help" button is located at the top right of each page. It will be helpful to have as much information pulled together before you start, and to have some familiarity with "uploading" electronic documents such as in Adobe Acrobat "PDF" or Microsoft Office format files. Have a printer ready for printing the permit when you have completed the ESSA self-certification for CCCL field permits. Read closely the limitations and restrictions on using your permit.
