







TAYLOR COUNTY

- 363 major structures damaged mostly due to Helene's storm surge;
 74% of these were destroyed.
- Storm tides to 15 feet.
- Only minor beach erosion.
- Wetlands showed substantial resilience.

55 major structures damaged, including 38 destroyed








CATASTROPHIC DAMAGE – KEATON BEACH

CATASTROPHIC DAMAGE – DARK ISLAND


22 major structures damaged, including 13 destroyed





DIXIE COUNTY

- 185 major structures damaged, including 112 destroyed.
- Horseshoe Beach had 74 Single Family Dwelling's destroyed; another 48 with major structural damage.
- Most damage due to the storm surge and waves.
- Damage a little greater than 2023's Hurricane Idalia.
- Major beach and dune erosion on Bird, Cotton and Butler Islands.
- Adjacent wetland shorelines resilient with little erosion.





SOUTHERN DIXIE COUNTY


- Storm tides between 12 to 15 feet county-wide.
- Major beach and dune erosion on Shired, Big Pine and Little Pine Islands.
- The wetland shorelines were anchored by oysters and wetland plants and experienced little, if any, shoreline retreat.





COTTON ISLAND EROSION – PRE-STORM (LEFT); POST-STORM (RIGHT)








SHIRED ISLAND, DIXIE COUNTY (CRITICAL EROSION AREA)








LEVY COUNTY

- Major beach and dune erosion on Deer Island and Gomez Key north of Cedar Key
- Major beach and dune erosion on Seahorse Key and Atsena Otie Key south of Cedar Key
- Mostly minor beach erosion on Cedar Key
- Helene Worst storm in recent history of Cedar Key
- 86 major structures damaged to wind, storm surge and waves, including 32 destroyed.
